
#### **Introduction to Fox Theatre Institute**

 Founded in 2008, FTI is a dynamic outreach program offering grant funding, operations advice and technical assistance

- Georgia at one time had more than 200 historic theatres, arts centers, auditoriums and drive-in theatres with about 150 operating presently statewide
- We also offer a Friends of the Fox Membership program, Fox in a Box education program and our statewide presenting consortium known as Georgia Presenters



#### **Introduction to Fox Theatre Institute**



- Our programs are funded through Fox Theatre ticket sales, concessions and merchandise
- Additionally, our Friends of the Fox membership program provides limited revenue funds for all FTI programs
- We only seek outside grant funding for our educational programs



#### \*\*\* Introduction to Fox Theatre Institute

- Since 2008 FTI has awarded more than \$2.2 million dollars to more than 60 grants in Georgia with additional emergency focused support in Alabama, South Carolina and North Carolina
- We have invested more than \$263,000 in Block Booking Grants for Georgia Presenters







# **ARTS PROGRAMMING**







### **Assessing Trends-Georgia**

- Since April 2020 our FTI Team has worked closely to support our Georgia Presenters and they are our first contact for monitoring performance trends
- We also look at statistics available through the Georgia Council for the Arts and the National Endowment for the Arts
- We additionally receive statistical reporting for all of our Block Booking Grants for Georgia Presenters

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#### **Assessing Trends-NEA Statistics**

National statistics reveal generally the following about Georgia:

- In the past five years, the National Endowment for the Arts distributed more than \$17 million dollars of in grants
- 4.6 percent of \$28.7 billion was added to the state economy from arts and cultural production
- The Georgia Council for the Arts works with countless individuals and organizations to ensure growth for the arts



### **Assessing Trends-NEA Statistics**



 The arts and arts industries employed 154,259 workers in the arts and cultural industries, with workers earning wages and benefits totaling more than \$12 billion

#### **Assessing Trends-Georgia Presenters**




We rely on our Georgia Presenters to help us measure trends, especially post-Covid 19. Here is a look at representation:

- 11-from the Metro-Atlanta Area/ARC Region arts organizations
- 14-from arts organizations below Macon
- 30-from arts organizations outlying counties in North Georgia



## **Covid-19 Considerations**



- Generally, more audiences have returned since 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter 2021
- Average closure was between 10-14 months and the Fox Theatre was 17 months
- Tickets being typically sold closer to the show
- Performers rescheduling more now than canceling as in earlier pandemic



### **Covid 19 Considerations**



 Many theatres are seeking accreditation for building clean air and safety standards

 Some theatres combining program opportunities with other organizations

 Staffing shortages have presented problems as venues return to more pre-2020 capacities



## **Covid 19 Considerations**



 Most of our college/university Georgia Presenter organizations were used for classroom during early pandemic and even still frequently

 Most of our Georgia Presenter organizations still operating at 1/3 of less of the previous operation

 We are hoping to see a stronger economic recovery by 4<sup>th</sup> quarter 2022

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


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#### FTI, Fox in a Box Program

- As of FY 2022 our Fox in a Box program has visited over 37,000 students and teachers
- Our education programs are FREE
- We offer a K 3<sup>rd</sup> grade curriculum interactive exhibit
- Recently we converted the program to a virtual, year- round program that includes camp, learning pods and and homeschool groups







#### FTI, Fox in a Box Program

- The virtual program has now been shared with over 15,167 students and teachers since February 2021
- We have reached 20 county school systems with the virtual program
- We have begun implementing the virtual programming in partnership with YMCA and CHOA educational programs
- FY21-22 goal is to double the 2,829 participants from FY20-21. To date, over 12,338 are committed for FY21-22

Virtual Programming & Funding

Outside grant awards received during the pandemic helped grow the program to our virtual opportunity **These amazing grants included:** 

\$25,000 from AT&T Foundation

 \$6,000 from Georgia Council for the Arts through the National Endowment for the Arts

\$2,500 grant from South Arts

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# FUNDING





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#### **Urgent/Emergency Fund Grants**

Urgent or Emergency support is available to historic theaters and related structures in emergency situations when immediate and unanticipated work is needed to save a historic structure

Examples of urgent or emergency needs include:

- Fire or water damage
- Natural disasters

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• General disrepair posing an immediate threat to the structure or architectural integrity



#### **Urgent/Emergency Fund Grants**

These grants can range up to \$100,000

 A cash match is not required for these projects – however, a grant award from FTI may be used as leverage for other support







#### **Urgent/Emergency Fund Grants**

- Our funds can be used for financial support with stopping Imminent demolition
- An option to purchase a structure (temporary or long-term), especially if a detrimental structural change





# During Covid 19 Recovery-Grants

During ongoing recovery FTI is supporting grants in these ways:

- We are prioritizing grant projects that have an Urgent/Emergency need
- We are encouraging our grantees to use our funds as needed to match higher grants if needed
- We are working hard to make sure all our past and future grantees are aware of pairing grant programs

**Pex Theatre (Eatonton):** FTI partnered with the Eatonton DDA to purchase the Pex Theatre through acquisition funds available as an emergency resource

The Pex Theatre will be rehabilitated and used again as a theatre







**Theatre Albany (Albany):** The grant helped complete repairs to the façade of the building damaged by severe tornados including the columns and masonry









#### The Southside Theatre Guild in Fairburn FTI 2020 Urgent Needs Grant Request

**Southside Theatre Guild (Fairburn)**; FTI supported the removal of a failing roof and construction of a new one including coping

The theatre is one of the oldest operating theatres remaining in Metro Atlanta and serves a large southside community







#### **Additional Funding-Southface**

Our newest partnership began in 2020 and provides energy consultation and financial support through the GoodUse Program grants

- Quarterly application process for \$45,000 grants, up to four grants per cycle
- Requires match and portion may be "in kind"
- Engineering and sustainably professional consulting provided to all awarded theatres
- Open to all theatres in the GA & SE


#### **Best Practices-Beyond Funding**

- Continue to form partnerships with organizations who share similar goals for the arts
- Be transparent with board members and patrons about financial needs
- Find good champions in local government and other local non-profits for projects and prioritize highest needs





#### **Best Practices-Beyond Funding**



 When applying for arts grants leverage opportunities to accomplish similar goals (festivals, city/county school programming, etc.)

 Take advantage of joint social media opportunities such as "go fund me" campaigns

 Meet regularly with partner organizations to avoid repetition in funding asks
