Profile of Older Georgians

9% of older Georgians are food insecure.

Georgia is ranked 7th amongst states older adults are moving to. 76% of adults age 50+ wish to 'age in place' -- to remain in their homes as long as possible. 92% of adults born before 1945 wish to do so.

More than 2 million older adults live in Georgia. 10.7% live in poverty.

79.2% of Georgia seniors own a home; 38.6% live alone.

Over 75% of older Georgians receive Social Security.

In 2022, 14.6% of Georgians were 65+, up from 12.7% in 2019. 41.2% of older adults in Georgia have a disability.


Access to home and community-based services (HCBS) can help prevent or delay nursing home placement for some older adults.

In 2022 Georgia grandparents were the primary caregivers of more than 100,000 children.



DAS Staffing




69% of our staff are dedicated to Elder rights & elder abuse prevention!














Allegations Reported by Type





Financial Abuse

May include but not limited to:

- ✓ Forced to withdraw large sums of money
- ✓ Power of Attorney
- ✓ Use of threats to get money
- ✓ Change of legal documents
- ✓ Loss of savings
- √ Forging signatures
- ✓ Using coercion or deception to gain trust
- ✓ Spending Social Security benefits/VA benefits for own use





Possible Signs of Financial Abuse

New "person of trust" isolates the victim

 Change in status: used to save every penny, now they are withdrawing money every week

- Appoint someone new to handle their affairs
- Missing jewelry



Quick deeds of family property or businesses

- Senior Center Staff and Volunteers
 - Signs of elder abuse
 - How to report possible abuse

 - Collaborating to prevent elder abuse






Multidisciplinary Teams by Judicial Circuit

As of January 2023

- Formed by District Attorneys or their designee
- Key players at one table
- Follow the pattern of DV and Child Abuse MDTs
- Data shows increases in arrests of perpetrators, increase in access to services, and overall combined community collaboration
